Thank you for submitting your coin to PriceThatCoin.com.

We examined your photographs. In our professional opinion, the coin pictured is:

#1. A counterfeit 1943-D Bronze Lincoln Cent.

#2. From these images, it is clearly a known counterfeit with no collectible value.

Your photographs (rated 6 / 10) are okay for determining grade and authenticity. This is a coin that should only ever be purchased already certified.

#3. The surfaces are mushy, and the design details are inaccurate.

#4. Current Market Value (10/1/2018)

This coin, in this condition, has no U.S. collector coin market value. It is not labelled "COPY" as is required for sale in the United States.

If the coin was authentic, it would have substantial value. If it were marked "COPY", making it legal to buy and sell, its value may be \$1 to \$2.

If you disagree with our professional opinion and would prefer to pursue guaranteed numismatic certification, we recommend either PCGS or NGC. Getting the coin to the certification service from India will not be easy. The cost will be in the hundreds to thousands of dollars, depending on postage. There are coin shows on the Asian continent you could attend to submit your coin in person, but none that we are aware of in India.

#5. Grade (Sheldon Numismatic Grading Scale, 1-70, 2018 Market ANA Standards):

Counterfeit

We technically grade the condition of the coin **Counterfeit**.

#6. Composition and Mintage

Because the coin is counterfeit, its composition and mintage are not known.

#7. Certification Recommendation

Certification: No.

To protect, authenticate and certify the coin, you may wish to submit the coin to a [reputable Third Party Grading service](#). **The overall cost of submission is much higher than the value of the coin.** The time required for certification, including shipping and handling to and from the certification service, is typically between two weeks and two months. The cost of certification, not including shipping and all handling fees, is over \$1000 for a genuine example of a coin like

this. We recommend that you contact your preferred certification service customer service department over the phone to determine the best course of action. Also, this type of coin will require provenance – ownership trail – all the way back to the date it was minted. The cost and time required for certification vary widely based on the [reputable Third Party Grading service](#) you choose and the services you request. Variety and error specifications may have an added cost. However, when the coin is shipped back to you, it may be graded and encapsulated in a protective case that ensures long-term protection. If the coin is special to you and you're not concerned with recouping any investment, certification is advisable.
